ZIMBABWE FLYER PILES ON THE PRESSURE

THE pressure is on in the NatWest Series as England and West Indies clash at Lord's with both looking for their first win of the tournament.

Surprise packets Zimbabwe have turned the competition on its head with opening victories and it is now left to the two more established nations to spare their blushes by getting off the mark.

Marcus Trescothick's magnificent 79 was not enough to stop England crashing to defeat as gritty Zimbabwe clung on for a well-earned victory- and the action can only get more intense from here.

There are still eight fixtures to go in this finely-

balance series, which, in the best traditions of one-day cricket, promises to go right down to the wire as the three teams go toe-to-toe for glory.

From Old Trafford to Edgbaston, Trent Bridge to Lord's, the action will not stop until one of the nations are able to call themselves the champions.

So far we have seen a breathtaking array of skill and athleticism at the crease and in the field, with colour, noise and legions of fans watching on with hearts in mouths from the stands.

It's not quite yet win-or-bust as two old foes square up, but defeat would make qualification for the glittering Lord's finale so much more difficult.

Alec Stewart has all the experience in the world, but with two of his key men sitting on the sidelines, will it be enough to overcome the frightening pace attack and fearless batting of a West Indies side itching to make up for their heart-break in the second Test on this same ground?

CAPTAIN Andy Flower guided Zimbabwe to a convincing five-wicket victory over England at The Oval to continue his side's impressive start to the NatWest Triangular Series.

Flower hit a disciplined 61 as Zimbabwe reached their victory target of 210 with 10 balls to spare, having opened the tournament with an equally emphatic six-wicket victory over West Indies at Bristol on Thursday.

He helped rescue his side after they slipped to 35 for three chasing England's disappointing 207, forging a crucial 123-run partnership with Alistair Campbell which laid the foundations for their successful reply.

England had made a promising start to their campaign with debutant Marcus Trescothick sharing a 106-run stand with Graeme Hick off just 117 deliveries which looked to have put them on course for a formidable total. Indeed,

Trescothick's knock was the 12th-highest debut score in one-day international history.

But once Trescothick was caught on the square-leg boundary for an impressive 79 the seventh-highest score by an England player on his one-day international debut England lost nine wickets for 71 in 22.1 overs and added only 57 in the final 18 overs.

Grant Flower, one of Zimbabwe's many highly-effective back-up bowlers, helped himself to three gift wickets for a cost of nine in the last desperate slog to pick up some of the missing runs.

England's disappointing display - coming just a week after their dramatic Test win over West Indies across London at Lord's - showed the other side of their character and looked all the worse because Zimbabwe were without their four leading strike bowlers Henry Olonga, Heath Streak, Pommie Mbangwa and Mluleki Nkala all absent through injury.

Alec Stewart

Acting England captain Alec Stewart admitted his side's batting cost them against Zimbabwe.

"From a batting point of view, it was a very thick performance. We know to post a big total we have to have two big partnerships, we had one and after that we threw our wickets away. "We didn't go about it in the right manner. I thought Zimbabwe showed us how to bat by the way they chased that total.

"We've seen them bowl them before, and we've had a platform of 136 for one and then we were 153 for five and that's not good enough. It was a good wicket and we didn't make the most of it."

Key Player

Graeme Hick

Silenced his critics with a wonderful half-century as England piled up the runs early in their innings. Hick showed steel and aggression as he almost toyed with Zimbabwe in a glorious period of play.

Zimbabwe captain Andy Flower pointed to his bowlers as the reason for his side's success.

He said: "The slower bowlers did the job. We've played some reasonable cricket since the Lord's Test defeat. "That was huge shock, it was our worst performance since being given Test status.

"There's still a long way to go to the final, I'm not thinking of it yet, there's a lot of cricket to play. We aren't used to starting one-day tournaments off with two wins. "I'd like to keep our feet firmly on the floor and keep doing certain things right."

Alistair Campbell

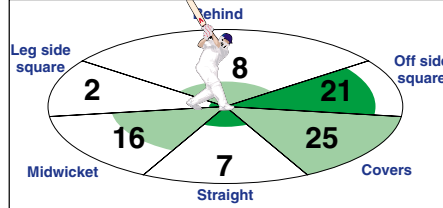

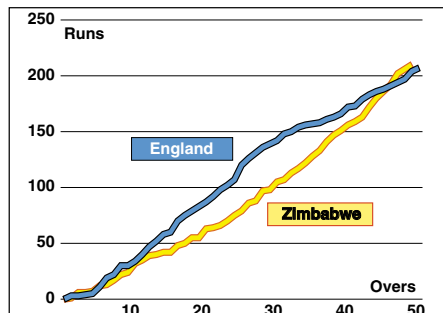
Campbell celebrates his 50

Player to watch

Marcus Trescothick
Profile: A revelation on his senior England debut as he hammered 79 off 102 balls against Zimbabwe, the gangly Trescothick will be looking for another nerveless performance against the West Indies. Called into the squad in place of the injured Nick Knight, the Somerset ace looked as though he had been playing at this level for years as he swept the Zimbabweans all over the Oval in a glittering display. Long considered one of the most able players on the county scene, it looks as though the 24-year-old could at last be about to prove his immense potential on the big stage.

The Pitch

The most famous trait of the surface at Lord's is the slope which runs from the Grandstand side to the Tavern side of the ground. The drop in height across the pitch has been measured at seven feet and has aided many a ball on its way to the Tavern boundary.

9th July at Lord's

ENGLAND return to Lord's and another showdown with the West Indies in the NatWest Series with veteran Alec Stewart still on a high after the dramatic events of the last Test match. Stewart, who played in his 126th one-day international in the defeat against Zimbabwe, has not donned the blue colours since the World Cup - another reason why he is itching to bring about a repeat of last weekend's two-wicket victory which ranks as one of England's finest performances in years.

He said: "The Lord's win has affected the public. When I've taken the kids to school, all the teachers

and parents have been stopping me and want to talk about the cricket.

"I think it's given everybody a lift, the players and the public, and hopefully we'll see that continue throughout this tournament."

Nasser Hussain and Nick Knight are out of the latest ding-dong battle between the two nations - given extra spice after both sides went down to Zimbabwe in their opening games - despite making progress with their finger injuries.

Both will net for the first time next week ahead of England's day-night international against Zimbabwe at Old Trafford.

Player to watch

Jimmy Adams
Profile: Despite being in the veteran stage of his career, skipper Adams is still the man who holds the West Indies together. Leading by example, the 32-year-old is charged with the task of bringing the best out of the unpredictable Brian Lara, and so far the signs are that he has done just that. Adams came in last in the first NatWest Series game with Zimbabwe, scoring just two runs before the curtains fell on the innings. Quiet and intelligent, he is slowly turning around the decline in the most famous cricketing nation on earth, as well as keeping the fire burning on his own career.

NATWEST SERIES – HOW IT WORKS

- All matches will consist of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.
- Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.
- In matches without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.
- Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.
- At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 minutes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.
- Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each innings.
- Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes.
- The innings of the team batting second shall not commence before the scheduled time unless the team batting first has completed its innings at least 30 minutes prior to the scheduled interval. In such circumstances a 10-minute break will occur, the team batting second will commence its innings and the interval will occur as scheduled.
- At the instant of delivery there may be not more than five fieldsmen on the leg side.
- For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced.
- No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.
- A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- Teams will wear coloured clothing and use white balls manufactured by Duke.
- Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.
- If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.
- The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to: The most wins in the group matches. The team that won the most matches between the tied sides. The team with the higher run rate. The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls. In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team have 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team B have less resources available than team A, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team B's revised target is obtained by scaling down team A's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team B have more resources available than team A, calculate the amount by which team B's resources exceeds team A's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team A's score to give team B's target.
